A Message about Wildfire Preparedness from GM Dennis D. LaMoreaux



It is frightening to imagine January's destructive fires in Altadena and Pacific Palisades happening in the Antelope Valley. But it did happen on a smaller scale five years ago in Juniper Hills during the Bobcat Fire. They all began as vegetation fires that became urban firestorms. Recently, our customers have asked, "Can it happen here?" and "What can be done to protect our homes?"

Yes, it can happen here. The Bobcat Fire is the latest example. There have also been previous wildfires in the Angeles National Forest that burned close to Palmdale before being controlled. We will always be faced with this threat due to our proximity to the forest. Therefore, it is an important part of Palmdale Water District's (PWD) operations and planning. Examples of our preparation include coordinating with the Los Angeles County Fire Department on testing and maintenance of fire hydrants, designing water systems to meet fire flow requirements for developments, and signing an agreement for firefighting aircraft to use water from Lake Palmdale.

Additionally, PWD has stationary and mobile generators with different fuel sources to improve the reliability of water production and booster facilities during power outages; increases water in storage during fire weather events; has emergency interconnections with neighboring water agencies; and has multiple layers of mutual aid agreements.

All these steps we have in place will help during wildfires. However, it is still possible for wildfires to overcome the water system's ability to fight it. Public water systems are built to provide safe, clean water, not fight wildfires. But customers can take steps to reduce the risk of losing their homes to a fire.

Despite Dry Weather Locally, Drought Restrictions Not Expected for Customers

PWD customers will not face mandatory drought restrictions or penalties this year, even though the area has received little rain this winter. With the state's 35% allocation in late February and water carried over from last year, PWD will have enough supply to meet customers' needs.

The State Water Project's 35% allocation will give PWD 7,455 acre-feet (AF) of water. In addition to the carryover of 3,600 AF from 2024, the District has rights to 5,500 AF from the Littlerock Dam and can pump a minimum of 4,300 AF from groundwater wells. The total of 20,855 AF is more than the 16,000 AF of water needed for customers this year.

An acre-foot of water is equal to 326,000 gallons. A family of four in Palmdale uses an average of 143,000 gallons of water annually.

"We are pleased to inform our customers that they don't have to worry about drought restrictions this year," said PWD Resource and Analytics Director Claudia Bolanos. "It will also allow us to save water for 2026. We're thankful that the northern Sierra Nevada has a good snowpack. It helps us during a winter when we saw limited rain. But I'd like to remind everyone to continue conservation efforts."

By early June, the state will issue a final water allocation percentage.

These include maintaining a defensible space around the house, installing ember and flame-resistant attic vents, keeping gutters clean or covered, and adding weather-stripping to close gaps around garage doors.

New Fast Chargers for Electric Vehicles Will Be Available at PWD






PWD began offering an electric vehicle charging station for the community in late 2017. The former charging station was no longer functioning properly and needed to be replaced.

"We decided to move in a different direction and found EVCS," said PWD Facilities Manager Wendell Wall. "Working with EVCS was a win-win. It is a turn-key project where they applied for the funding and will do all the installation. It was at no cost to PWD."

The project is funded by a grant from the Antelope Valley Air Quality Management District.
